PANELISTS' BIOS

Clarissa Lins



Founding partner at Catavento Consultoria, created in August 2013, Clarissa is a Trustee at CEBRI. From November 2019 to March 2021, Lins was the President of the Brazilian Institute of Oil and Gas (IBP), where she also held the position of Executive Director between 2016 and 2019.

She is a member of Suzano's Sustainability Committee since August 2019 and of the World Economic Forum's Global Future Council on the Future of Energy since September 2018. She was a member of Petrobras' Board of Directors between May 2018 and December 2019, an independent member of the Sustainability Committee of Vale's Board of Directors between May 2017 and December 2019, and Executive Director of the Brazilian Foundation for Sustainable Development between 2004 and 2013.

She worked in the public sector for several years, at the Ministry of Finance (1993-94), at Brazil's National Bank for Economic and Social Development (BNDES) as special advisor to the Presidency (1995-99), and at Petrobras, as special advisor to the Presidency and Executive Manager of Corporate Strategy (1999-2002). Lins obtained both her bachelor's and master's degrees in Economics from the Pontifical Catholic University of Rio de Janeiro (PUC-Rio).

Oliver Letwin



Before entering politics, Oliver was an academic at Cambridge, a civil servant in Margaret Thatcher's policy unit, and a Director of NM Rothschild. He was elected to the UK Parliament in 1997 as MP for West Dorset, and served in the Shadow Cabinet for 10 years including stints as Shadow Home Secretary and Shadow Chancellor.

In Government from 2010 to 2016, he was an architect of the Coalition and a senior minister for 6 years, serving as Minister for Government Policy and Chancellor of the Duchy of Lancaster. He chaired the Home Affairs Committee and a range of other Cabinet Committees, acted as Minister for National

Resilience, and was a member of the National Security Council.

In Parliament from 2016 to 2019, he played an active role in the Brexit debates. He has been a privy councillor since 2002, and was knighted in 2016. He retired from Parliament in 2019. Currently, he is a Visiting Professor at KCL, where he chairs the Project for Peaceful Competition, a Vice President of the Great Britain China Centre, a Fellow of the Legatum Institute, a Senior Adviser to the Faraday Institution and to Teneo, and a member of the Advisory Council of the Bennett Institute for Public Policy at Cambridge.

He has published widely in academic and popular journals, and is the author of a number of books including the recently published China vs America: a Warning.











Armando Zamora



Mechanical Engineer and Specialist in High Government from Los Andes University; Armando Zamora Reyes, current President of the National Hydrocarbons Agency (ANH). He has a Master of Science and Doctorate in Engineering from MIT, and an MBA from IMD (Lausanne). He is an Honorary Professor at the Centre for Energy, Petroleum and Mining Studies of the University of Dundee (Scotland), where he was Deputy Director.

Mr. Zamora was the first Director of the National Hydrocarbons Agency from 2003 to 2011, emphasizing in the creation and strengthening of the new regulatory authority of the hydrocarbon sector in Colombia, as well as the adoption of a new model for concession contracts. He organized and executed six area bid rounds for exploration and production of the hydrocarbon sector,

derived as modern, competitive and fair.

Among other achievements, he has also served as Senior Advisor to Accenture Strategy Energy and Schlumberger Business Consulting, Senior Consultant to the Boston Consulting Group, and Consultant to the IDB, the World Bank, the International Monetary Fund and the International Finance Corporation. He previously worked at Mobil de Colombia, the Institute of Nuclear Affairs, Carbocol and Corporación Invertir en Colombia, currently Procolombia.

Tatiana Rosito



Tatiana Rosito is a Senior Fellow at the Brazilian Center for International Relations (CEBRI). She was also the founder of CEBRI's China Analysis Group in July 2017, which she coordinated until October 2020. She is a diplomat and an economist, currently working as a consultant at the New Development Bank (NDB) in Shanghai. She has worked for more than ten years in Asia, where she served at the Brazilian Embassies in Beijing and Singapore, following her posting at the Brazilian Mission to the United Nations in New York. She was Petrobras' Chief-Representative in China and General Manager for Business Development in Asia from 2017 to 2019.

Previously, she was Executive Secretary at the Brazilian Foreign Trade Board (CAMEX) and Special Advisor to the Ministers of Finance and Planning, among

other roles in the public service. She is also an invited member of the Consultative Committee of the Brazil-China Business Council. She holds a Master's degree in International Development from the Harvard Kennedy School and an Executive MBA from INSEAD and Tsinghua University.

Rogério Studart



Rogério Studart is a Senior Fellow at CEBRI and has participated in different debates on macroeconomics, sustainable development, Brazil-China relations and international finance. In addition to being a consultant for the United Nations, multilateral institutions, and governments, he is a member of the Board of Directors of Centro Brasil no Clima and a Distinguished Fellow of the Global Federation of Competitiveness Councils. He works and advocates on initiatives to advance policy-driven, evidence-based analysis of the costs, benefits, and opportunities of environmentally sound, low-carbon growth and development.

He was Executive Director of the World Bank Group (including IFC, IDA and MIGA) and the Inter-American Development Bank (including IIC and FOMIN),

and a Senior Fellow at the Brookings Institution and the World Resources Institute. He has held positions as a Macroeconomist and Specialist in development finance at the United Nations (ECLAC and UNCTAD), at IBGE, and at Banco Lar Brasileiro. As an academic, he was the author and co-author of several books, published articles in











specialized journals, and was a professor at the Faculty of Economics and the Institute of Industrial Economics at the Federal University of Rio de Janeiro (UFRJ). He holds a PhD in Economics from University College London, England.

Larissa Wachholz



Business and institutional affairs executive with extensive experience in the Chinese market, having lived in Beijing between 2008 and 2013. Throughout her career, Larissa has worked in the areas of infrastructure, energy and agribusiness. She was a special advisor to the Minister of Agriculture, Livestock and Supply of Brazil on matters related to China (2019-2021). Larissa holds a master's degree in Contemporary China Studies from Renmin University of China. She is a Senior Fellow at CEBRI and a regular contributor to academic research and the media on topics related to Sino-Brazilian relations.

Xizhou Zhou



Xizhou Zhou is a vice president at S&P Global Commodity Insights and leads the company's power and renewables practice globally.

Mr. Zhou has expertise in power and renewable market fundamentals analysis and forecasting, power market design and policy analysis, renewable energy business models, and company strategies, among other areas. He previously headed the firm's Power, Gas, Coal, and Renewables practice in Asia Pacific, managing energy research and consulting activities across regional teams based in Beijing, Delhi, Seoul, Singapore, and Tokyo.

Mr. Zhou began his career at S&P Global and IHS Markit through one of its predecessor companies, Cambridge Energy Research Associates (CERA), as part of its Emerging Markets and Global Power groups in Cambridge, Massachusetts. Before that, he worked as a consultant on regulatory economics for Industrial Economics, Inc. in Boston and as a research analyst at the World Resources Institute in Washington, DC.

Fluent in Mandarin Chinese and proficient in Spanish, Mr. Zhou holds a Bachelor of Arts and a Master of Environmental Management, both from Yale University in the United States. He is currently an editorial board member of China Petroleum Society's official journal, Guoji Shiyou Jingji (International Petroleum Economics).

He also serves on the Board of Trustees of the YaleChina Association. He is based in Washington, DC.











Karin Costa Vazquez



Karin Costa Vazquez is Senior Non-Resident Fellow at the Center for China and Globalization, Fudan Scholar at Fudan University (China), and Associate Professor and Assistant Dean at O.P. Jindal Global University (India), where she leads the first center for African, Latin American and Caribbean Studies at an Indian private university.

Vazquez has advised UN entities and development finance institutions worldwide and has led high-profile initiatives, including the 2022-2025 Strategic Framework of the UN Office for South-South Cooperation and the Brazilian Development Association 2030 Sustainable Development Plan to leverage the contribution of 32 financial institutions to the SDGs.

In the government, she directed a UK fund to support Brazil's transition to a low- carbon, high-growth economy and represented the Brazilian Ministry of Foreign Affairs in multilateral negotiations.

Vazquez contributes regularly to some of the world's leading media outlets, scientific journals, and think tanks on issues like international cooperation and finance, sustainable development, and international political economy, with a focus on Brazil, China, India, and the new multilateral development banks.

Her most recent publications include the articles: New Asian Development Finance (IDS Bulletin), Brazil and BRICS multilateralism à la carte: from bilateralism to community interest (Global Policy), Up or out: how China's decarbonization will redefine trade, investments, and external relations (Turin University), and the upcoming book chapter Brazil-China relations: contestation, adaptation, or transformation? (Palgrave Macmillan).

Arthur Kroeber



Arthur co-founded the China-focused research service Dragonomics in Beijing in 2002 and was the editor of its flagship journal China Economic Quarterly through 2017. Since Dragonomics' 2011 merger with Gavekal he has been head of research for the combined operation.

Before founding Dragonomics, he spent 15 years as journalist specializing in Asian economic affairs, and reported from China, India, Pakistan and other Asian countries.

He is also an Adjunct Professor of Economics at the NYU Stern School of Business, a member of the Council on Foreign Relations and of the National Committee on US-China Relations, and a senior non-resident fellow of the Brookings-Tsinghua Center in Beijing. His book "China's Economy: What

Everyone Needs to Know" was published by Oxford University Press in 2016, with a second edition in 2020, and is widely used in university classrooms.

Lívia Machado Costa



Lívia Machado Costa is a Senior Editor and Co-Founder at Shumian 书面, one of Brazil's largest news platforms focused on China.

She is also an Editorial Assistant at Diálogo Chino and an Incoming PhD Student at the University of California, Irvine, at the department of Global Studies, where she will focus on how Chinese climate goals interact with global commodities such as soybeans and meat produced in the Brazilian Amazon region.











Marco Tulio Scarpelli Cabral



Marco Tulio Scarpelli Cabral heads the Consular Documents Division, Brazilian Foreign Affairs Ministry (MFA), since January 2021. He headed MFA's Environment Division II, dealing with climate change, ozone and chemicals (2019-20); was Coordinator of the International Relations Research Institute (IPRI 2016-18); and advisor at MFA's Human Rights Department (2013-16). He served in the Brazilian Embassy in Beijing (2009-13) and the Brazilian Mission to the EU, Brussels (2006-09); and worked at MFA's Sustainable Development Division (2002-05). He holds masters' degrees in philosophy (UFMG 2002, ULB 2007) and is doing a philosophy PhD at Brussels' Free University (ULB). He is a diplomacy graduate (IRBr/MFA 2002) and a specialist in structural engineering (UFMG 1997), and holds a BA in architecture and urbanism (UFMG 1994).

André Aranha Corrêa do Lago



André Corrêa do Lago is an Ambassador and Member of the Brazilian Center for International Relations (CEBRI)'s International Advisory Board. He has been a diplomat since 1983 and was Brazil's Ambassador to India.

In the field of architecture, he is an author, curator, and jury member. He has been a member of the Pritzker Award jury for three years. He is also a member of the jury for the IMS competition in São Paulo and the jury for the new headquarters of IMPA (mathematics) in Rio.

He has worked in several areas at the Ministry of Foreign Relations, mainly in the environmental area. He was Brazil's Chief Negotiator for Climate Change and Sustainable Development, including at Rio+20. He served in Madrid, Prague, Washington, Buenos Aires, and Brussels. He was Ambassador to Japan for five years. He is co-curator and co-author of "Still Modern?" together with Lauro Cavalcanti.

Florencia Rubiolo is currently an Associate Researcher at the National Scientific and Technical Research Council (CONICET), Argentina.
